# National Museum

## 1a Republic Square

*Opening hours: Tuesdays, Wednesdays,  
Fridays & Sundays: 10:00–18:00  
Thursdays & Saturdays: 12:00–20:00  
(Closed on Mondays)*

Established in 1844, the National Museum is the oldest museum in the country. Its most treasured exhibit is the Miroslav Gospel, the oldest and most valuable Cyrillic manuscript, dating from around 1190. The museum's collections include works by world-renowned artists such as Sandro Botticelli, Hieronymus Bosch, Albrecht Dürer, Titian, Tintoretto, Peter Paul Rubens, Rembrandt, and etc.



# Museum of Contemporary Art

10 Usce Street, Block 15

*(Closed on Tuesdays)*

Showcasing Yugoslav and Serbian art from 1900 to today, the Museum of Contemporary Art offers a comprehensive insight into the region's modern artistic development.

The striking museum building itself is a landmark of post-war Yugoslav architecture and is widely considered the finest example of its kind in the former Yugoslavia.



# Historical Museum of Serbia

The Historical Museum of Serbia is a complex museum dedicated to presenting and interpreting the history of Serbia and the Serbian people, as well as the cultures and peoples who have lived within the territory of Serbia throughout history.



# Museum of Yugoslavia

6 Mihaila Mike Jankovića Street

*Opening hours: Tuesday–Sunday, 10:00–18:00*

Through its programmes and activities, the Museum of Yugoslavia promotes and preserves social memory and the culture of remembrance connected with the development of the Yugoslav idea, from its beginnings as a kingdom to its dissolution in the early 1990s. Through exhibitions, educational activities and interactive programmes, visitors can discover authentic stories, perspectives and experiences connected to the Yugoslav past.



# Ethnographic Museum

13 Students' Square

*Opening hours: Monday–Sunday, 10:00–20:00  
(Closed on Wednesdays)*

The Ethnographic Museum preserves the rich ethnographic heritage of Serbia and parts of the Balkan Peninsula. Its extensive collections explore ethnogenetic processes, traditional material culture, social relations, family traditions, customs, beliefs and folk creativity, showcasing the region's rich cultural heritage through a wide variety of authentic artefacts.



# Nikola Tesla Museum

11 Krunska Street

*Opening hours: Mondays 10:00–18:00;*

*Tuesday–Sunday 10:00–20:00*

The Nikola Tesla Museum preserves the original archive of the renowned scientist Nikola Tesla, recognised by UNESCO as part of the Memory of the World Register - the highest form of protection for cultural heritage. Alongside interactive demonstrations of Tesla's remarkable inventions and engaging presentations by expert guides, visitors can enjoy a short documentary film about the visionary scientist's life and achievements.



# Palace of Science

11 Kralja Milana Street

(Closed on Mondays)*

The Palace of Science is Serbia's first Centre for Research and Science Popularisation in Serbia and the largest of its kind in the region. Its exhibition spaces are designed for visitors of all ages who wish to explore the fascinating achievements of the human mind and the most distant corners of the Earth and the universe through unique scientific experiences and interactive exhibits.

# House of the National Assembly of the Republic of Serbia

The House of the National Assembly of the Republic of Serbia is the most monumental architectural landmark in the heart of Belgrade. Designed in the Neoclassical style, the building bears witness to the historical development and artistic achievements of the peoples and states of the former Yugoslavia.
